- 1. Confirming your Substitute Decision Maker(s), the person who will speak for you when you cannot.
- 2. Communicating your wishes, values and beliefs about personal care to your Substitute Decision Maker(s) to assist them in making decisions for you if you become mentally incapable of doing so.

Did you know, by law, EVERYONE in Ontario has a
Substitute Decision Maker (SDM) – even if they haven't
chosen one. It is important for you to know who your
